The group's Civil Engineer Squadron has been selected to participate in a joint humanitarian mission in Suriname, a young democratic nation on the northern coast of South America.

CES is scheduled to rotate two groups of its airmen into Suriname in early April, according to Senior Master Sgt. Tamera Askren, CES program analyst. Each 30-man group is expected to stay 18 days.

Airman Nabil Abdul-Kader, Civil Engineer Squadron engineering apprentice, helps inventory weapons during the July Unit Training Assembly. CES airmen will be taking the weapons with them in April when they leave for a humanitarian exercise in Suriname. a nation on the north coast of South America.

The squadron will be taking part in Operation New Horizons, a series of exercises aimed at helping people in Central and South America and the Caribbean while enhancing capabilities of U.S. Armed Forces to deploy and train in foreign environments.

"12th Air Force describes (a New Horizons exercise) as a logistics exercise with an engineering and medical flavor," Askren said.

Building schools and medical clinics will be CES's primary focus while in Suriname. They'll be based out of a Suriname military camp while actually working at five different locations outside their camp.

The mission and joint-task nature of the exercise will allow for just the type of training CES has been looking for,

931st planning for first AEF requirement

The 931st is scheduled to join with two other units to support an Aerospace Expeditionary Force Mission in the European Theater from Oct.1 to Jan. 1.

The current plan is for the group to team with the 939th Air Refueling Wing, from Portland, Ore., and the 434th Air Refueling Wing, at Grissom Air Reserve Base, Ind., to fulfill the 90-day mission.

While the 931st ARG has provided forces for past AEF's, this will be the first time it will have actual personnel requirements to fill during an AEF cycle.

Most of the details are still being finalized and each unit's planning office is still putting together the final details of how the deployment will be executed.

The AEF will require the 931st to fill about 20-30

slots from aircrews, maintenance, intelligence and personnel support during the entire duration.

The selection of who will go and how they will rotate into the AEF requirements will be finalized at a joint planning meeting to be held at a yet to be determined day this month.

"We are going to meet to determine what personnel each unit is going to provide, what type of rotation we will need and any other details to support the AEF," said Maj. Clint Burpo, 931st Planning and Operations chief.

The first priority for the group's flying squadron is to look to the current mobilized forces first, according to Maj. Scott Dickmeyer, 931st operations plans officer.

"We will start with those who still have mobilization orders and want to stay mobilized," Dickmeyer said.

Volunteers on 15-day rotations utilizing annual tour will fill the remaining positions.

according to Askren.

"This is what we do everywhere we go, just the building system will be a little different," Askren said, referring to some prefabrication materials her engineers will be using for the first time. "The Army will be there. The Navy and Marines will be there ... this will prepare us for the real thing. If we get mobilized, it's likely we will be part of a joint task force; that's almost always how it is now."

The exercise will also mark the first humanitarian mission for CES since it became part of the 931st in 1995 and will end more than two frustrating years of being put on hold.

"All of my guys (and gals) are real excited to actually pack up and go somewhere," Askren said. "They worked their tails off for the last two years to get ready to join a fight and 'the war' kept getting cancelled."

The "war" Askren figuratively re-

ferred to is actually a series of cancelled Inspector General Exercises and other world events she and her engineering comrades thought they might be a part of. Some real world experience in Suriname may be just what the doctor ordered for Askren's work-hungry airmen.

"Engineers have this need to build things," Askren said with a jovial smile. "You have to get them out there or they start getting grumpy."

CES isn't the only squadron whose members the mission in Suriname will be getting "out of the office." The group's own 18th Air Refueling Squadron is scheduled to provide airlift support for the trip.

Maj. Joel R. Clay, a Tulsa University graduate with a Bachelor of Arts Degree and a Masters of Theology Degree from Southern Methodist University, comes to the 931st from the 913th Maintenance Squadron at Willow Grove Air Reserve Station, Pa.

Prior to his service at the 913th, Clay was the 507th's chaplain from 1985 to 1991. He left his position as chaplain to pursue his dream of flying.

Clay did get his private pilot's license, but ended up not getting all the way to the commercial airlines.

"I went for my dream," he said. "I didn't want to look back when I was older and wished I had gone for it."

Clay later took over as the quality assurance officer at the 507th where he was able to use many of the same skills he employed as a minister with the United Methodist Church in Oklahoma from 1978 to 1991. "Quality was what I did for the church, so this was a great fit for me," Said Clay.

Clay went to the maintenance officer trainee program

in 1997, served a short stint at Air Force Reserve Command Headquarters, Robbins AFB, Ga., and was



commander in March 2000.

Clay's leadership principles are simple.

"I have three absolutes: Everything is done safely. Be professional. If you're safe and you're professional then you're doing your job. Finally, if you're doing these things then Have Fun!" said Clay. "It's amazing to me that people work some place that they don't enjoy. If you don't enjoy what you are doing do something else."

Clay said he is also a strong believer in mentorship, and trusting his folks to do their job. "The purpose of a leader is to have people who can take over if the leader were to die tomorrow."

Clay was born in Miami, Okla., and calls Choctaw, Okla. home. Clay and his wife Peggy have one son, Shawn, and will celebrate 30 years of marriage next May.

The 931st Air Refueling Group's Chaplain's office got a little bigger during the July unit training assembly.

1st Lt. John Dobbs became the newest member of the group's chaplain office after serving one year as a reserve chaplain for the 301st Fighter Wing at Ft. Worth, Texas. Previous to serving at the 301st, Dobbs spent three years in

the Air Forces chaplain candidate program.

"I like ministering to the people of the Air Force," said Dobbs. "There is something

about the professionalism I really enjoy being around. It's not the rank structure, it's about ministering to airmen and their families."

Dobbs said his proudest career moment so far was earning his mission badge while in the candidate program. "I'm really looking forward to learning more about the Air Force," he said. "I consider it a great honor to be sitting behind Chaplain Peters. I look forward to learning from him what it means to minister to the 931st and the Air Force."
