# **Group member shines for active-duty**

The 22nd Air Refueling Wing, the 931st's host unit at McConnell AFB, recently finished what a departing Inspector General Team Chief described as "one of the best inspections (he'd) seen in an awfully long time."

The inspectors selected four airmen to receive IG coins for epitomizing the exemplary work that made such a successful inspection possible. One of those four was Master Sgt. Johnny Stephenson, a traditional reservist with the 931st serving on active-duty with the 22nd ARW.

Stephenson was recognized for his outstanding achievements as the superintendent of the 22nd's alert facility. He volunteered to go on active-duty and take over the facility soon after the Sept. 11 attacks in 2001. His active-duty su-

"It was an honor to see a man who has done so much to better the military response capability receive such high praise for his efforts," White said.

White told Stephenson there were three things that earned him a coin. First was his reformation of the

alert facility. Before the terrorist attacks, the building was occupied by personnel offices and used for some real world

# 'New improved' AMC better for operations

As of Oct. 1, the 15th and 21st Air Force's were redesignated Expeditionary Mobility Task Forces and the 18th AF was reactivated.

The reason for the change is to provide an efficient and effective mobility fighting structure that fully supports expeditionary operations. To do this, there must be a clear delineation of staff and operational responsibilities.

Air Mobility Command will sharpen its focus to non-warfighting functions such as organizing, training, and equipping the force.

The 18th AF will be responsible for global execution of the operational

alerts and exercises. "A lot of people didn't know it was even there," Stephenson said.

But by Sept. 12, 2001, more than 200 people were swarming the halls of an alert facility that was obviously in need of more attention.

"They said, 'Here's the facility, do what you can with it," Stephenson remembered. "I said, 'Can I have some money?' and they said, 'No."

Faced with a great deal of work and a minimum of resources, Stephenson said he "learned a lot" about acquiring materials on a base when funding is short.

"The inspectors said they were impressed because I didn't have any funds," Stephenson said. "They were impressed with the way I utilized what was available."

Transforming and maintaining the facility wasn't all Stephenson was responsible for during his two-year tenure. "I handled everything from maintenance to arranging meals with services," Stephenson said. "When crews were in the facility I had to monitor where they were at all times."

White said Stephenson's exceptional work with his services squadron was the second reason the inspectors gave him a coin, but there was a third action by Stephenson

mission and refocusing on its traditional role of warfighting.

The Tanker Airlift Control Center will be the centralized worldwide tasking center for the 18th AF, in essence a global air operations center. TACC will now report directly to the warfighting commander (18AF/CC) instead of the force provider (AMC/CC).

This should enhance mobility command and control. The AMC staff functions have also changed. Traditional AMC directorates are coalescing into an "A" staff structure (A-1 through A-



8) similar to U.S. Central Command Air Forces. For instance, mission support groups will fall under A-7, a single AMC focal point for mission support issues.

The 15th and 21st EMTFs will lead four Air Mobility Operations Groups and their subordinate units in providing a full range of expeditionary mobility support. They will no longer have the redundant staff functions that the 15th and 21st AF's had.

The new improved AMC. Right now it seems a bit confusing, but over time the group will get used to the new way of doing business with AMC. In case you are wondering, Air Force Reserve Command and the 4th Air Force are not changing.

that truly displayed his willingness to go above and beyond the call to duty. Some security forces members assigned to the alert facility area started showing wear from the extreme heat this past summer.

Stephenson could tell some of the


guards weren't hydrated enough so he used his own money to buy them replenishing drinks. His deed not only helped him earn an IG coin, the security forces chief gave him a coin too.

"The chief was in the facility and somebody pointed me out to him and said, 'There he is," Stephenson said. "For a second I thought I was in trouble, but it turned out he just wanted to thank me for helping his troops."


Stephenson did such a good job for the 22nd he transcended the reservist stereotype and fooled his co-workers into thinking he was part of them.

"They didn't know I was a reservist until I told them," Stephenson said. "It was hard to get it through that I needed a replacement. They kept asking me, 'Are you PCSing (changing duty stations)?""

The active-duty had to let Stephenson go in September. But he didn't "PCS" back to his civilian job in Salina. The 931st gained his full-time services as the new Standards and Evaluation administration chief.


