Air Force releases new mission statement

WASHINGTON (AFPN) -- The realities of the world have changed dramatically since the creation of the Air Force in 1947 and continue to change almost daily.

With these changes in mind, Air Force leaders released a new mission statement Dec. 7 that defines the current and future direction of the Air Force.

"Today, our world is fast paced, constantly shifting and filled with a wide range of challenges," Secretary of the Air Force Michael W. Wynne and Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. T. Michael Moseley wrote in a

joint Letter to Airmen. "Our mission is our guiding compass, and now more than ever we need it to be clear and precise."

The mission statement defines the "where and what" the Air Force accomplishes on a daily basis:

The mission of the United States Air Force is to deliver sovereign options for the defense of the United States of America and its global interests -- to fly and fight in Air, Space, and Cyberspace.

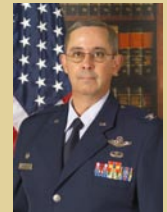
The statement includes two new con-

Did you know that during FY05 the 931st performed over 18,000 MPA orders? That's 18,000 days of manpower we made available to take on active duty taskings! In addition we did over 13,000 mandays of Reserve and school tour orders for a total of over 31,000 mandays of work!

That doesn't even account for UTAs and other inactive duty training. You folks are incredible. People across this Group have volunteered their time and talents to support the Global War on Terrorism and to remain ready for mobilization. You have much to be proud of.

As we look ahead to 2006, there will continue to be opportunities to serve your country at home and abroad. cepts, “sovereign options” and “cyberspace,” which the secretary and chief defined.

They said having sovereign options is the essence of being a superpower.

“Our task is to provide the president, the combatant commanders, and our nation with an array of options ... options that are not limited by the tyranny of distance, the urgency of time, or the strength of our enemy’s defenses,” they said. “With one hand the Air Force can deliver humanitarian assistance to the farthest reaches of the globe, while with the other hand we can destroy a target anywhere in the world.”

The term cyberspace includes network security, data transmission and the sharing of information.

“We have quite a few of our Airmen dedicated to cyberspace ... from security awareness, making sure the networks can’t be penetrated, as well as figuring out countermeasures,” Secretary Wynne said. “The Air Force is a natural leader in the cyber world and we thought it would be best to recognize that talent.”

Adversaries of the United States will use any method or venue necessary to contest America, and it is an Airman’s calling to dominate air, space and cyberspace, the leaders said.

“If we can decisively and consistently control these commons, then we will deter countless conflicts,” they said. “If our enemies underestimate our resolve, then we will fly, fight, and destroy them.”

Using past air power pioneers as examples of understanding the mission, they said, “The Air Force’s mission statement has evolved over time, but it does not change the nature of who we are or what we do.”

Med Group sets SABC instructor class for February

The 22nd MDG will conduct a self-aid buddy care instructor’s Course. The following requirements must be met before instructing a SABC class: be an OJT Trainer and attend formal classroom training (SABC instructor course). Once instructors become certified they must teach at least two classes in two years to maintain certification.

Did you know the following personnel are exempt from SABC training: Pararescue Specialty, Aircrew members who have completed combat survival training (IAW MCI 10-202), members who have completed survival training are exempt for 24 months, nonmedical personnel with current nationally registered EMT and chemical agent symptoms and treatment training, and members who are current card holders of American Red Cross advanced first-aid. These personnel must also be able to recognize and treat chemical agent contamination.

Units desiring to have members SABC instructor trained must submit names by January 7, 2006. Each student must ensure they bring their individual first aid kits to class with them

TDY travel changes

You can make airline, hotel or car rental reservations one of two ways. The first is by calling Carlson Wagonlit Travel at 316-689-8300. One of the travel agents at Carlson will make your reservations for you and will then email you the itinerary. Or you can go to Carlson's web site at www.cwtres.com to make your own arrangements. When you use your government charge card to secure travel reservations thru Carlson Wagonlit Travel, your card will be charged a transaction fee which can range from \$8.75 for an agent arranged hotel reservation to \$18.30 for an agent arranged airline reservation. Space-A Prohibited Change

The following changes to the prohibited items list for air travel were implemented December 22nd. Scissors with a cutting edge of four inches or less and tools such as screwdrivers, wrenches and pliers smaller than seven inches will now be permitted on board. Scissors longer than four inches and tools such as crowbars, drills, hammers, and saws will continue to be prohibited from carry-on bags. Lighters will continue to be banned from the cabin of aircraft and

in checked baggage. Up to four books of safety (non-strike anywhere) matches are permitted as carry-on items, but all matches are prohibited in checked baggage.

Request DD-214 online

Military veterans and their next of kin can now request copies of their DD-214 and other military records through a new Web site.

By law, the center is required to obtain a written signature verification by fax or mail within 20 days of an online request. The new site is located at:
