18th ARS deemed "Mission Ready"

The 931st Air Refueling Group received an overall rating of "mission ready" during the group's Aircrew Standardization/Evaluation visit.

Evaluators from Headquarters Air Mobility Command conducted the ASEV, covering aircrew performance, Standardization/ Evaluation and training programs.

Aircrew Performance

The team conducted 37 flight evaluations with all evaluated aircrew members exhibiting a high degree of professionalism and crew resource management and coordination. In addition, all 18th Air Refueling Squadron aircrew members were given closed book and bold face examinations; all crewmembers passed the exam with an overall average of 98.7%. The overall aircrew performance was graded *Outstanding*.

Standardization/Evaluation

Ten Stan/Eval programs were reviewed during the visit. Four were graded excellent, five were graded satisfactory and one was graded marginal.

The overall standardization/evaluation grade was *Satisfactory*.

Training Programs

The ASEV team evaluated seven training programs. Six were graded satisfactory and one marginal. The overall grade for training programs was *Satisfactory*.

Overall

The 931st ARG is capable and ready to execute its global air refueling mission. They prepared a robust schedule to demonstrate to ASEV evaluators their aircrews' abilities and unit's programs. Overall, the 931st ARG is graded *Mission Ready*.

"The unit did a great job pulling together to prepare for this inspection, very rarely do you see a unit of our size get through an ASEV without a single aircrew testing or flight downgrade," said Lt. Col. Keith Kontz, 931st Air Refueling Group chief of Standardization/Evaluation.

Next UTA: Dec. 9-10

Jan. 6-7 Feb. 10-11 March 10-11

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WASHINGTON -- Air Force leaders are gathering in early November to discuss plans for creation of a new command, one chartered with flying and fighting in cyber space.

Cyberspace became an official Air Force domain, like air and space, on Dec. 7, 2005, when Secretary of the Air Force Michael W. Wynne and Chief of Staff of the Air Force Gen. T. Michael Moseley introduced a new mission statement.

In a letter to Airmen, they said the new mission was to "deliver sovereign options for the defense of the United States of America and its global interests -- to fly and fight in air, space and cyberspace."

Now, Air Force leaders are planning to stand up a new "cyber command," to be responsible for fighting in that domain, said General Moseley.

"To deliver the full spec-

trum of effects we will evolve a coherent enterprise, with warfighting ethos, ready to execute any mission in peace, crisis and war," the general said. "We will foster a force of 21st century warriors, capable of delivering the full spectrum of kinetic and non-kinetic, lethal and non-lethal effects across all three domains. This is why we are standing up an operational command for cyberspace, capable of functioning as a supported or supporting component of the joint force."

Air Force leaders begin planning for the new cyber command Nov. 16 at the Cyber Summit. During the summit, Air Force leaders will chart a way ahead for the Air Force's role in cyberspace, also called the cyber domain, said Dr. Lani Kass, director of the Air Force Cyberspace Task Force.

"The chief of staff of the Air Force is going to gather his senior officers and talk about the new domain, in which, according to our mission, we are going to fly and fight," she said. "Our objective is to come out with a course, a vector, that will set us up for transforming our Air Force, to get us ready for the fight of the 21st century."

According to Dr. Kass, cyberspace is

neither a mission nor an operation. Instead, cyberspace is a strategic, operational and tactical warfighting domain -- a place in which the Air Force or other services can fight.

"The domain is defined by the electromagnetic spectrum," Dr. Kass said. "It's a domain just like air, space, land and sea. It is a domain in and through which we deliver effects -- fly and fight, attack and defend -- and conduct operations to obtain our national interests."

The cyber domain includes all the places an electron travels. The electron, which is part of the atom, can travel from one atom to the next. This concept is key to electronic communication and energy transmission.

"As parents we are very proud of Dan and the way he conducts himself and his accomplishments on and off the field," said Lt. Col. Kontz.







Industry Days emphasize Air Force need for new tanker

WRIGHT-PATTERSON AIR FORCE BASE, Ohio-

Nearly 100 people from industry and the government attended the Oct. 24 kick off of Tanker Industry Days in nearby Dayton, Ohio.

Sponsored by Aeronautical Systems Center's 653rd Aeronautical Systems Squadron at Wright-Patterson AFB, Industry Days enhanced competition through communication with industry and additionally fostered small business participation in the Air Force's number one acquisition priority--the KC-X Tanker.

While Oct. 24 marked the public portion of the KC-X Industry Days, Oct. 25 and 26 were set aside for attendees to participate in one-on-one sessions with the base's Small Business Office representative to exchange information.

According to Teresa Rendon, small business specialist, Industry Days allow small businesses an opportunity to learn about the 'big' program and engage in one-on-one dialogue with the larger corporate world.

"This dialogue then opens the door for small businesses to possibly become subcontractors," said Ms. Rendon.

According to Terry Kasten, director of the 653rd Aeronautical Systems Squadron, Industry Days also allows industry to reach out to the Air Force and develop a better understanding of the proposed acquisition strategy and request for proposal, the process the Air Force uses to solicit bids from contractors.

"This contact creates synergy by providing industry and small businesses a networking forum," said Mr. Kasten.

He added that the event provides a transparency to the acquisition process while also giving industry insight on what it takes to build an entire weapon system.

During a briefing, Mr. Kasten explained why a replacement tanker is needed. He quoted the Air Force Doctrine Document, Air Mobility Operations, March 1, 2006, saying, "Air refueling enhances the unique qualities of airpower across the full range of military operations. It enables operations and multiplies the effects of operations."

He said the KC-X represents a solid recapitalization strategy. It will replace a rapidly aging air refueling capability in the KC-135 with a multi-role capability and will give more flexibility to the warfighter.

The overall cost of the program is around \$20 billion, which includes the purchase of 179 KC-X aircraft over a 15-year period beginning in 2010. The next major milestone for the program will be the release of the final request for proposal in December or January 2007.

DD-214 Online

The National Personnel Records Center has created a website for veterans to gain access to their DD-214s online. This may be particularly helpful when a veteran needs a copy of their DD-214 for employment purposes. NPRC is working to make it easier for veterans with computers and Internet access to obtain copies of documents from their military files. Military veterans and the next of kin of deceased former military members may now use a new online military personnel records system to request documents. Other individuals with a need for documents must still complete the Standard Form 180, which can be downloaded from the web site. Because the requester will be asked to supply all information essential for NPRC to process the request, delays that normally occur when NPRC has to ask veterans for additional information will be minimized. The new webbased application was designed to provide better service on these requests by eliminating the records center's mailroom processing time. To obtain a DD-214 or for more information, visit:


